They carry hundreds of genealogy books and genealogy supplies and he will be bringing some of these items for sale at our meeting. They also can be found online at www.hqrl.com


Please mark your calendars for this date and plan on attending. Hope to see you there.

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LETTER FROM YOWANN TO THE MEMBERS OF PNCS

I receive the certificate, thank you all very much indeed. I consider it a great honour.

We're all well here, and very busy. We did have a week's holiday in April, when Siaron and I hired a sailboat on Loch Ness. That was excellent fun, although we didn't spot Nessie!

I haven't been down to Cornwall for a while, although I have been very actively involved in the Cornish language spelling controversy, which just keeps getting worse and worse. The big problem is that suddenly, after years and years of hard work by volunteers, there is a huge pot of money available to support Cornish from the European Union, and a bunch of people who know next to nothing about Cornish are trying to muscle in on the act. It's truly heartbreaking. I don't have an article to send you, but I do have a copy of my letter which was published in the Western Morning News recently - you're very welcome to reproduce it in the PNCS newsletter, if you want to, although it may not be of interest to all members. I've copied it below. Many thanks again, and keep in touch. Gans ow gwella gorhemmynadow, Yowann

More than twenty years ago, as a teacher, Bard of the Cornish Gorsedh and fluent Cornish speaker living in Cornwall, I suggested Kernewek Kemmyn or Common Cornish as the name of the revised spelling system for our ancient and beautiful language. Since then, with some small revisions, Kernewek Kemmyn has served the Cornish language movement admirably, but it is now under attack from a tiny number of individuals because, finally, after many years of unpaid work and dedication by scores of volunteers, Cornish is now receiving recognition, support and funding at an unprecedented level.

I suggested the name Common Cornish because I hoped that the system would become precisely what the name suggests: the most common, widely used and frequently encountered way of spelling Cornish, and that indeed is what it has become. The vast majority of books, magazines and other published material, the vast majority of dictionaries and vocabularies, the translation of the Bible, the vast majority of classes, both in Cornwall and around the world: all of these are conducted in Kernewek Kemmyn. The reason is very simple: like Spanish, Welsh and a few other languages, the Kernewek Kemmyn spelling system allows new learners to pronounce words quickly, easily and accurately.

It would be a tragedy if the astonishing gains made by the Cornish language movement were now to be thwarted and set back by this tiny minority of disgruntled individuals, who in the same period of twenty-plus years have come nowhere near producing any viable alternative to Kernewek Kemmyn, and are unlikely to produce one even if they were given another twenty years. And we can't wait that long. When I was Education Secretary of the Cornish Language Board, I wrote the very first GCSE examinations in Cornish. I wrote the very first television programme in Cornish, 'An Canker Seth,' which was broadcast by Television South West in the 1980s. There are now far better and worthier Cornish teachers, writers, poets, editors, film-makers and broadcasters hard at work on developing the language, and the vast majority of them support and use Kernewek Kemmyn. For the sake of the children who will be learning Cornish in schools, if for no others, it is vital that we use Common Cornish as the basic, standard spelling system. If the few disgruntled academics prefer to use other systems for themselves, they are perfectly welcome to do so – just as academics read Anglo-Saxon or Chaucer in the original spellings - but the living language of Cornish requires a living, breathing orthography: and that is Kernewek Kemmyn.

Please remember that my genealogical endeavors consumed a great deal of time, travel, and money. Therefore it is my desire that the products of these endeavors be allowed to continue in a manner that will make them available to others in the future.
