Marjorie and her five siblings were all born in Tacoma, Washington, but later moved to Puyallup where Marjorie graduated from high school. Her mother was born in 1920 in Eatonville, Washington, one of four children. They all attended Kapowsin all grade school and grew up on a farm in Elk Plain.

Her mother's father was John Sidney Bennett, born in Great Falls, Montana in 1892. The family lived in a small house in Boston Heights, twenty seven blocks east of downtown, just across the Missouri River from the Anconda Copper Smelter. There was a foot bridge for workers to cross over to work.

His father, John Bennett and wife Jane Giles Edwards came to Montana in 1890 from Ludgvan, Cornwall. They had followed relatives who already lived in Superior and Stockett, not far from Great Falls. After about nine years in Great Falls, they moved to Hoquiam, Washington where John established a blacksmith shop, which years later became a trucking company.

Marjorie has followed her family on Ancestry and learned that both her Bennett and Edwards lines came from Cornwall. She found Aussie relatives too, who were part of the massive exodus to find work in mining places around the world.

Marjorie has found PNCS meetings very helpful in learning about the Cornish people and their history and is enjoying reading books in our library.

She is now looking forward to her first trip to Cornwall in July with her son and family, and has made a list of sites, including Ludgvan and Penzance, and family graves she hopes to visit. She would love to have your input on any sights or foods that you feel are a must when visiting Cornwall.

Bob Bruce, who is the Choir Director Emeritus at the First Presbyterian Church, is the person responsible for obtaining our meeting place in Puyallup for all these years. It makes it very easy for people to find us every year in March. Bob himself is Scottish but also Cornish-by–marriage to Shirley.





For much of its life span Levant had five or six hundred employees, men, women and children. A typical miner's day was long and very hard going; a life under the sea was not easy and life above it was hardly better.

THE LEVANT MINE DISASTER occurred 100 years ago, and this is the day remembered as of one of the saddest days in the history of West Penwith. On October 20, 1919, Pendeens close-knit mining community was plunged ito mourning, when the Levant man-engine broke and sent 31 local miners to their deaths. The late William Lawry was the youngest boy working below ground that day and was on the man- engine at the time of the disaster. Miraculously he survived. Fifty years later he wrote down his account of the tragedy and then gave it to a couple of tourists he met on the coastal path near his St. Just home. Many years later, the manuscript was rediscovered and returned to the Geevor Mine, where it is looked after today by the Trevithick Trust.

1748 Levant Mine first appeared on Martyn's Map, as an amalgamation of three other early mines: Zawn Brinney, Boscregan and Wheal Unity. Its location is remote, but deposits of tin and copper were rich.

1820 Levant Mining Company was formed with a capital of $\pounds 400$. A group of 20 people were involved in the company, which was divided into 80 shares. It went on to become a great success – in one period of two months, it made $\pounds 4,630$.

1836 By this time, 320 men, 44 women and 186 children were employed at the mine. Many of the women and children were involved in 'dressing' the ore: preparing it for sale.

1840 Michell's whim engine was made by Harvey's of Hayle. Designed by Francis Michell, its purpose was to carry ore from the deep workings – some extending beneath the sea – to the surface.

1857 The man engine was installed. This aimed to make the transporting of miners up and down the workings faster and easier. Each day, miners changed into their work clothes in the Miners' Dry (changing room) before walking down the tunnel to Man Engine Shaft.

1919 The Levant mining disaster. Thirty-one men were killed when a link between a rod and the man-engine snapped, sending the engine down the shaft. The engine was not repaired, and the deep levels were never worked again.

1930 Levant Mine closed after losing large amounts of money. A major factor in this was that in the midst of an economic depression, the price of tin had dropped dramatically.

1967 Levant passed into the care of the National Trust. In the same year, the Trust also took on the care of East Pool Mine, near Redruth.

It was at the Pacific Northwest Highland Games in Enumclaw, WA that they came across the PNCS who have a tent close by where they met Terry Maves and Craig Pedlar who told them about the work of the Society. So, in 2019 Chris and Val joined.

Chris was born in the late 1940's in Bishop's Stortford, 30 miles northeast of London, England. He had a Scottish Mother, an Irish Grandfather and A Grandmother from Penzance in Cornwall whose maiden name was "Teague". He met Val in Chamonix, France in 1995 and they were married in Scotland exactly a year later. Chris then moved to Kent, WA to join Val and her two young sons from a previous marriage. He then worked for a disability nonprofit in Tacoma for 13 years before retiring.

Val was born and raised in south Seattle in Washington. Married to Chris Ensor, mother of two adult sons and grandmother to a delightful 11-year old granddaughter. Val is an active Council member and National Membership Commissioner for Scottish Clan Johnston/e; a Toastmaster member since 2007, she serves regularly in public speaking and leadership roles along with co-leading a Gluten Intolerance Group locally. Val worked in the banking industry throughout her career and recently retired, allowing for more time with family, friends and travel. She has a desire to learn more about her ancestry DNA results with 37% ethnicity estimate located in England, Wales and Northwestern Europe.

VISITING CORNWALL & OTHER CELTIC NATIONS:

In gathering information on the Celtic Nations Val and Chris decided it would be important to visit all the main Celtic Nations. They travel regularly to Scotland where Chris has relatives. In starting to explore the others they travelled to Wales and Cornwall last October and plan to visit Ireland and the Isle of Man this year.

CELTIC NATIONS:

Val and Chris want to include representatives of all the Celtic Nations in a venture they embarked on 3 years ago with the Celtic Arts Foundation based in Mt. Vernon, WA. This is the Kent International Festival. It's held each year to celebrate Kent's diversity by promoting the sharing and understanding of different cultures (Kent is considered to be the 10th most diverse city in the USA). Chris and Val had attended for several years in their Scottish kilts. They were asked to add to the growing number of cultural booth by providing a Scottish one. They however thought that Scotland is too narrow and instead they should broaden the scope to include as many Celtic Nations as they could find. (The list includes Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Isle of Man, Cornwall, Brittany in France and Galicia in Spain). Chris and Val are trying to include information at their booth from as many organizations representing these nations that have a presence in the Puget Sound and surrounding areas including of course, the PNCS.


